FROM THE PRINCIPAL



Pigs in School

York District High School is excited to be participating in the 2025 Pigs in Schools Competition, offering a unique, hands-on agricultural learning experience for selected Year 9/10 students.

Students will partner with Cunderdin Agricultural College and their expert piggery manager, Ms Jemma Read, along with Year 12 Certificate III Pork Production students. Cunderdin will host and care for the pigs, while York DHS students will travel to the College across five training visits in Terms 2 and 3 to learn about pig husbandry and prepare their animals for competition.

The program will culminate at the Perth Royal Show (Sept 27 - Oct 4), where students will present their pigs and compete in three judged components: live exhibit, carcase quality, and a student-led project on pig care.



Deadly Coders

We were thrilled to host the Return to Country Workshop in partnership with the University of Melbourne and Deadly Coders, on Thursday 24 July.

This 1-day, high-energy workshop saw all Year 7-10 students, Indigenous and non-Indigenous, challenged to think creatively and critically through real-world tech challenges. Sessions included:

Workshops were led by University of Melbourne students, with support from Deadly Coders instructors, bringing fresh energy and real-world insights into the classroom.



NAIDOC Week

York District High School is proud to be celebrating NAIDOC Week with a range of meaningful activities and learning experiences across the school. Throughout the week, students will engage in class-based and whole-school events that honour and explore Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander history, culture, and achievements.

The week will culminate in a special Smoking Ceremony and Celebration Assembly on Friday 8 August, where our school community will come together to reflect, respect and celebrate this year's NAIDOC theme.

Families and community members are warmly invited to attend Friday's celebration as we recognise the importance of truth-telling, culture, and connection to Country.

Pathway Planning

As we move through Term 3, it's an important time for students to begin thinking about their next phase of life-long learning. For our Year 6 students, the focus is on preparing for the transition to high school — a big step that brings new challenges, opportunities and responsibilities. Our Year 10 students are encouraged to start exploring their post-Year 10 pathways, including options such as enrolling at Northam Senior High School; Applying to Cunderdin Agricultural College; Pursuing a trade or skill through TAFE; Entering the workforce with employment opportunities

These conversations are crucial, and we encourage families to support their child in considering strengths, interests and future goals. Staff are available to provide guidance and support as students begin planning the next stage of their educational journey.



Law Courts

On July 2 our Year 7 and 8 students had the exciting opportunity to visit the Law Courts of Western Australia as part of their Civics and Citizenship studies in HASS.

The excursion offered students a hands-on experience of our justice system, including participation in a mock trial and the chance to observe real court proceedings in the Magistrates, District and Supreme Courts. This valuable experience deepened their understanding of how laws are applied and upheld in our society.

A big thank you to all involved in supporting this excursion — it was a powerful and educational day that brought our classroom learning to life!

Chaplaincy

At York District High School, our Chaplaincy service offers vital emotional and practical support to students, staff and families. Whether it's a quiet one-on-one chat, help navigating tough times, or simply building self-esteem and resilience, the Chaplain is here to listen, support and encourage. The Chaplaincy Room is a welcoming space where students can safely explore emotions and life challenges. Lunchtime activities like karaoke, chalk art, loom bands and table tennis help build friendships and fun. Our Chaplain also runs Social Emotional Learning programs and coordinates the much-loved Breakfast Club with support from local CWA and volunteers. Chaplaincy extends beyond the school gates, assisting families with food, uniforms, stationery and referrals to key support services. It's about creating a connected, caring school environment for everyone.





Breakfast Club

A nutritious start to the day is essential for students to concentrate, learn and thrive at school. That's why our Breakfast Club is such an important part of life at York District High School — helping ensure every child has the fuel they need for a successful day of learning. Held in Room 2 every Tuesday and Thursday morning, Breakfast Club provides students with a healthy meal in a warm, welcoming environment. This program is a vital service in supporting student wellbeing, focus and engagement. This program wouldn't be possible without the incredible generosity of our community volunteers, especially the dedicated women of the York Country Women's Association (CWA). Their time, care and delicious contributions help us make a real difference in the lives of our students.

ESCC Community Engagement

At York District High School, our Emergency Services Cadet Corps program gives students a hands-on, meaningful way to engage with and contribute to their community, while developing essential life skills and teamwork. Through the program, students in Years 7-10 participate in a range of age-appropriate training activities that build confidence, responsibility and leadership. This term our; Year 10 Cadets are currently completing the Keys for Life driver education course, preparing them for safe, informed driving; Year 9 Cadets are connecting with our local heroes by visiting York's volunteer fire and emergency services, gaining insight into their vital roles and responsibilities; Year 8 Cadets are diving into first aid and search-and-rescue training, equipping them with the skills to respond in real-world emergencies.

The Cadet Corps encourages strong community ties and instils a deep sense of service in our students — values that last a lifetime.

Components of an Explicit Direct Instruction (EDI) Lesson

Learning Objective

LO

Focused statement describing the skill and concept of the lesson.

Activate Prior Knowledge

APK

Quick review of skill or experience with a statement about how it is relevant to the learning objective.

Concept Development

CD

Concept **definitions** and big ideas supported by **labeled examples**. Precise academic language established. Questions to Check for Understanding.

Skill Development

Modeling == Guiding

SD

Concept-based steps with precise language. Matching problems, one for teachers to Model and one for teachers to Guide students. Questions to Check for Understanding.

Relevance

REL

Personal, academic, and real-life reasons why the lesson is **important** to learn.

Closure

CL

A skill-based problem, concept-based problem, and writing surmary to provide evidence of learning.
